Explain how the people in BOTH articles dance for similar reasons.

Rationale: This prompt will allow students to explain how the dances described in both articles are performed for similar reasons in the Ojibwe tribe and in Chinese culture. Students could begin in one paragraph by showing how both dances recognize cultural traditions. The student could refer to details that describe how Powwow recreates a dance from a traditional story that is important to the people who dance and to the people who watch them. The student could show how that is similar to Dancing Dragons which recreates a dance that was once performed to bring more rain and is now performed to bring good luck and new fortune. Students might next explain how the dances both exhibit special clothing and costumes. The student might refer to Powwow Summer which features a beautiful and special dress that is important to the dance, and then describe how the Dragon Dance is similar because it features a dragon costume with dancers dressed in matching clothing that is all important to the dance. In another paragraph, students might write that both dances are performed to share a special tradition with the whole community. The student might refer to details from Powwow Summer that shows how the community gathers to watch and celebrate in the dance. This could be compared to Dancing Dragons, where dancers wind through the crowds like a parade. In conclusion, students could use details from both articles to show several ways the dances are performed for similar reasons.

Similar reasons the dances are performed:

To recognize cultural traditions

- Powwow: recreates a dance from a traditional story that is important to the people who dance and to the people who watch them.
- Dragons: recreates a dance that was once performed to bring more rain and is now performed to bring good luck and good fortune.

To exhibit special clothing and costumes

- Powwow: features a beautiful and special dress that is important to the dance.
- Dragons: features a dragon costume (with dancers dressed in the same-colored clothing) that is important to the dance.

To share a special tradition with the whole community

- Powwow: The community gathers to watch and celebrate in the dance.
- Dragons: The dance wanders through the crowd like a parade.
